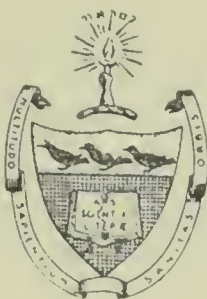

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# VICTORIA COLLEGE

*In Affiliation with the University of British Columbia*

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THE PURPOSE of Victoria College is to give students of Victoria City, adjacent municipalities, and Vancouver Island generally, an opportunity of receiving instruction in the first two years in the Arts and Science course (including Commerce) and in the First Year of Home Economics as prescribed by the University of British Columbia. Students attend classes on the same curriculum as obtains at the parent University; they are submitted to the same tests and examinations, and may proceed directly to their next year in the University of British Columbia, or in any other University which accepts the certificates of the University of British Columbia.

In 1894, by Act of the Provincial Legislature, High Schools of the Province were permitted to affiliate with recognized Canadian Universities.

Victoria High School, in 1902, became affiliated with McGill University in order to provide First Year work in Arts, and that part of the institution offering classes beyond Junior Matriculation became Victoria College. In 1907

the College undertook the work of the Second Year in Arts.

In 1906 the Provincial Legislature passed an Act incorporating the Royal Institution for the Advancement of Learning of British Columbia. This institution in the same year, established at Vancouver the McGill University College of British Columbia. In the following year Victoria College became a part of McGill University College.

In 1908 an Act was passed establishing and incorporating the University of British Columbia, and in 1915, upon the opening of the University of British Columbia, Victoria College, as part of McGill University College, ceased to exist.

In 1920 Victoria College was re-established, with its present affiliation with the University of British Columbia.

The College building is situated near the junction of Yates and Fort Streets, within a few minutes' walk of the street cars, and commands the most beautiful views of the City of Victoria, of Juan de Fuca and Haro Straits, and of the Olympic Mountains and Mount Baker, in the State of Washington.

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## IMPORTANT NOTICES

No student will be admitted to the College who has more than three units of failure outstanding either from Senior Matriculation or from a previous year in the College.

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As the College Session is short, the student must be prepared to do intensive work from the first day of the Session to the last. Unless the student adapts himself to these conditions, his chances of success are slight.

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The Principal and Staff are most willing at all times to give direction or advice, but the ultimate responsibility in the selection of courses rests with the student.

## Regulation of Victoria College Council forbidding Hazing and other Unauthorized Activities

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The following are prohibited:

1. Hazing.

2. Any act by any student attending the College or by any one at all causing injury or likely to cause injury to any person or damage to College property.

Any student violating the above regulation will be liable to immediate expulsion.

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Victoria College is governed by the regulations of the University of British Columbia, of which the official statement is the University Calendar: this calendar is a digest of such regulations.

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Students are warned not to assume that regulations remain unchanged from year to year. They should note regulations and outlines of courses as they appear in this Calendar.

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Application for admission should be made as early as possible after August 1st, 1946, at the office of the Registrar, Victoria College. Out-of-town students may register by mail. Students registering for the first time must present their University Entrance (Junior Matriculation) Certificates.

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### College Book Store

All text-books and student supplies can be purchased at the College Book Store which is within the College building.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

### The Session

The College Year or Session is divided into two terms. The first begins on Thursday, September 19th, 1946, and the second on Monday, January 6th, 1947 .

### Courses of Study

For the Session 1946-47 the College offers instruction in the first two years of the Faculty of Arts and Science (including Commerce), leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce, and in the first year of Home Economics leading to the degree of Bachelor of Home Economics.

By a proper selection of First Year courses in Arts and Science, students may equip themselves to enter at the University, the first year of Applied Science, the second year of Pharmacy, and the first year of the Combined Course in Nursing and Health and of the Double Course in Arts and Science and Nursing and Health. A suitable selection of courses in the first two years of Arts and Science will enable students to continue, without loss of time, the work in Agriculture at the University.

Courses preparatory to Medicine, Dentistry, Law, etc., are given in so far as the curriculum applies.

### Board and Residence

A list of approved boarding-houses which receive men or women students, but not both, may be obtained from the Registrar. Men and women students are not permitted to lodge in the same house, unless they are members of the same family, or receive special permission from the Faculty.

## ADMISSION TO THE COLLEGE

All inquiries relating to admission to the College should be addressed to the Registrar.

Except under special circumstances, no student under the age of sixteen is admitted to the College.

Candidates for admission to the courses in the First Year are required to pass the University Entrance (Junior Matriculation) Examination of the Province of British Columbia, or to submit certificates showing that they have passed an equivalent examination elsewhere.

Students who have passed the Senior Matriculation Examination are admitted to the work of the Second Year in the Faculty of Arts and Science.

Students who have partial Senior Matriculation standing, obtained in 1927 or subsequently, will be granted credit in the First Year in each subject in which they have made 50 per cent. or over, or in each paper in which they have made 50 per cent. or over, in so far as these papers correspond to those of the First Year. Students over eighteen years of age with full "Normal Entrance" standing who hold Normal School certificates are admitted to the College as having full University Entrance standing.

## REGISTRATION

Those who intend to register as students of Victoria College for the session 1946-47 are required to make application to the Registrar before Monday, September 16th, on forms to be obtained at the Registrar's office.

There are three classes of students.

(a) Full Undergraduates—Students proceeding to a degree who have passed all the examinations precedent to the year in which they are registered.

(b) Conditioned Undergraduates—Students proceeding to a degree with defects in their standing

which do not prevent their entering a higher year under the regulations governing "Examinations and Advancement."

(c) **Partial Students**—Students not belonging to one of the two preceding classes.

Partial students are not normally required to pass an examination for admission, but, before registering, must produce a certificate showing that they have satisfied the Principal and the Heads of the Departments concerned that they are qualified to pursue with advantage the course of study which they propose to undertake.

Students living out of town may register temporarily by mail on forms obtainable at the College, provided they complete their registration by the opening day. All other students are required to attend in person at the office of the Registrar between Thursday, August 1st, and Monday, September 16th, to furnish the information necessary for the College records, to register for the particular classes which they wish to attend; and to sign the following declaration:

"I hereby accept and submit myself to the statutes, rules, regulations and ordinances of Victoria College and of the Faculty in which I am registered, and to any amendments thereto which may be made while I am a student of the College, and I promise to observe the same."

In the information furnished for the College records, students are requested to state what church they propose to make their place of worship. This information is available for any of the city churches desiring it.

Students registering for the first time must present the certificates which constitute their qualifications for admission to the course of study for which they wish to register.

A student desiring to make a change in the course for which he has registered must apply to the Registrar for a "change of course." Except in special circumstances, no change will be allowed after October 7th. If the application is approved by the Departments concerned, the Registrar will give the necessary notification.

A student who at any time wishes to discontinue a subject must give notice of his intention at the Registrar's Office.

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### ATTENDANCE

Students are required to attend at least seven-eighths of the lectures in each course that they take. Admission to a lecture or laboratory and credit for attendance may be refused by the Instructor for lateness, misconduct, inattention or neglect of study. Absence consequent on illness or domestic affliction may be excused only by the Principal, and medical certificates or other evidence must be presented immediately to the Registrar on return to College work. In cases of deficient attendance students may (with the sanction of the Principal and Head of the Department concerned) be excluded from the Christmas or the final examinations in a course; but, in the case of a final examination, unless the unexcused absences exceed one-fourth of the total number of lectures in a course, such student may be permitted to sit for supplemental examination.

The College week is from Monday to Saturday inclusive, and lectures and laboratories may extend from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m.

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### FEEES

All fees are payable at the office of the Registrar, Victoria College. Cheques should be made to the order of the Registrar, Victoria College. Arrangements for paying fees in instalments are described

in the next section. The fees quoted below do not include cost of text-books, personal expenses, etc.

For students doing 15 units (complete course) or more during the session:

#### Special and Night Class Students:

The same as for partial students, except that the Alma Mater and Incidental Fees are not collected.

The Alma Mater fee is turned over to the Students' Council for the support of student organizations, athletics, and social functions. The Incidental Fee covers damages to buildings and furniture, use of special materials in the laboratories, replacement of library books, etc. Should the sum collected be insufficient, a second amount may be collected from each student.

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### PAYMENT OF FEES

Fees may be paid by either of the plans described below. Parents or guardians of students are required to state at the time of registration which plan they propose to adopt. In the event of default of payment at any time under either plan, students will be excluded from classes, and will not be re-admitted until all outstanding fees have been met.

**First Plan:** Fees payable in two instalments. The first, consisting of one-half the Tuition Fee plus Alma Mater and Incidental Fees, must be paid not later than Monday, September 16th, 1946. The second, consisting of the balance of the Tuition Fee, must be paid not later than January 16th, 1947. For students taking a full course (15 units) the payments under this plan are \$68.00 and \$60.00 respectively.

**Second Plan:** Fees payable in one cash payment and five monthly payments. The cash payment, consisting of one-sixth the Tuition Fee together with the Alma Mater and Incidental Fees must be paid by Monday, September 16th, 1946. The balance of the Tuition Fee must be paid in instalments on the 16th day of October, November, January, February and March respectively. For students taking a full course (15 units) the first payment under this plan is \$28.00 and each of the following five payments is \$20.00.

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### SCHOLARSHIPS AND PRIZES

First and Second Year Students in Arts and Science who are proceeding to a course of study in the University of British Columbia should note the page of the Calendar of that Institution concerning the Khaki University and Young Men's Christian Association Memorial Fund Bursaries.

**THE DOMINION-PROVINCIAL STUDENT  
AND BURSARY FUND  
AND PROVINCIAL LOAN FUND**

Under the Dominion-Provincial Youth Training Programme a sum of money has been set aside to aid University students who can offer proof of scholastic ability and financial need.

Application forms may be secured from the Department of Education, Technical Education Branch, Victoria, B. C., and must be returned not later than August 15th.

**PERCY H. ELLIOTT MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP**

—One hundred dollars (\$100.00) awarded to a student of outstanding merit and promise in one specific field of study, who has also a high general academic standing, and qualities of character indicating worthiness to hold the scholarship. The scholarship is awarded, upon the recommendation of a Staff Committee, to a student in the First or Second Year, and, unless service in the Armed Forces intervenes, proceeding immediately towards a University degree.

**ROYAL INSTITUTION AND FRANK EATON  
MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP**—Fifty dollars (\$50) awarded to the student taking the highest standing in the English of the second year.

**ALLIANCE FRANCAISE PRIZE**—Twenty-five dollars (\$25) awarded to the student in the second year who has made the most progress in French and who intends to continue university work in this subject.

**DAVID SPENCER, LTD., SCHOLARSHIP**—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the first year student taking the highest standing in Mathematics and continuing the course in the second year at Victoria College.

**KIWANIS SCHOLARSHIP**—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to a man student completing the first year and entering the second year at Victoria College. Selection of the recipient to be made by the Kiwanis Club of Victoria in conference with the College Faculty.

QUITA NICHOL BURSARIES—Two hundred dollars (\$200) donated annually to Victoria College by Mrs. W. C. Nichol, to provide scholarships in first and second year French. Two prizes of \$100 and \$50 respectively will be awarded in the first year, and one prize of \$50 in the second year. These prizes are normally awarded on merit, but, if necessary, special circumstances may be taken into consideration. Students must continue at Victoria College for their second year or the University of British Columbia for their third year.

UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S CLUB SCHOLARSHIP—One hundred dollars (\$100.00) awarded to the woman student taking the highest standing in her first year and continuing her course in the second year at Victoria College or at any other available at Victoria College. When a student wishes to attend a university outside Canada, the reasons for such attendance should be submitted to the Executive of the University Women's Club for approval.

THE KATHLEEN AGNEW SCHOLARSHIP—One hundred dollars (\$100) donated for the purpose of stimulating study of the History of Canada.

HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY SCHOLARSHIP—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the student taking the highest standing in Economics 1, and continuing his university studies without interruption.

SIDNEY ROOFING AND PAPER COMPANY SCHOLARSHIP—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the leading student of the second year, on condition that he continues his university studies without interruption in the third year.

\*THE CANADIAN LEGION, B.E.S.L., (VICTORIA, B. C.) SIR PERCY LAKE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP—One hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) to be awarded annually to a worthy student of Victoria College on the recommendation of the Faculty. To be eligible, a student must be a veteran of World War II, or a son or daughter of a veteran of World War II or World War I, or the wife or widow of a veteran of World War II and must continue his or her studies.

VICTORIA GYRO CLUB SCHOLARSHIP—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded annually to a male student completing his first year at Victoria College. The recipient is to be selected annually by a committee of the Gyro Club, upon the recommendation of the Principal of Victoria College, on the basis of qualities of leadership, distinction of mind and merit in games.

\*VICTORIA MUNICIPAL CHAPTER IMPERIAL ORDER OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE EMPIRE SCHOLARSHIP—Fifty dollars (\$50) awarded annually to a first year student who is the child of a veteran of World War I or World War II. The recipient of the Scholarship must be recommended for general proficiency and worth by the College Faculty, and must continue university work into the second year.

\*UNITED SCOTTISH SOCIETIES SCHOLARSHIP—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded annually to a student who is the son or daughter of a War Veteran, who is a member of one of the Scottish Societies. The candidate is to be selected by a Board of Trustees after consultation with the Principal of the College, and on the approval of the Associated Scottish Societies.

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\*To be applied for on forms obtainable at Registrar's Office. Applications must be in the hands of the Registrar not later than the last day of the final examinations.

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA ELECTRIC RAILWAY COMPANY, LIMITED, SCHOLARSHIP— One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the student with the highest standing who is proceeding, without interruption, to the First Year of Applied Science.

KINSMEN CLUB OF VICTORIA SCHOLARSHIP— One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded annually to a student of Victoria College. The recipient is to be selected by a committee of the Kinsmen Club, on the basis of outstanding scholastic ability and promise, upon the recommendation of the College Faculty.

ESTHER PEARCE MEMORIAL PRIZE—Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) awarded annually by Chapter N, P. E. O. Sisterhood, to a woman student in First Year for excellence in English.

The following scholarships are open to students who have completed University Entrance and are proceeding to Victoria College:

CECILIA GREEN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP— One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the first ranking student from Victoria High School in the University Entrance Examinations who has not already merited another reward. The recipient must attend Victoria College or the University of British Columbia.

VICTORIA WOMEN'S CANADIAN CLUB SCHOLARSHIPS— (1) One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the female student resident in Victoria District (Vancouver Island south of the Malahat) and attending a Public High School who makes the highest standing in the University Entrance Examination, held in June, and registering for a full first year course in Victoria College, or the University of British Columbia, the following September. (2) One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the male student resident in Victoria District making the highest standing in the same examination and under the same conditions. Should the student, in either case, be awarded a scholarship from any other source, the Club Scholarship shall then revert to the student having the next highest standing.

UNIVERSITY AND ROYAL INSTITUTION SCHOLARSHIPS FOR UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE, VICTORIA DISTRICT—Two scholarships of one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175) awarded for general proficiency in the University Entrance Examination. The winners must attend either the University of British Columbia or Victoria College.

JOHN M. HATCH MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP— Two hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$275) for four years presented for excellence in English and History.

# I.

## COURSES LEADING TO DEGREE OF B. A.

(Four-year course, two years of which may be taken at  
Victoria College)

### First and Second Years

1. The work of the first two years consists of 30 units, 15 of which must be taken in each year.

Each student must take:

(a) English 100 and 101 in the First Year and English 200 in the Second Year .....	6
(b) The first two courses in a language offered for University Entrance, one course in each year .....	6
(c) Mathematics 100, in the First Year .....	3

(e) Biology 100, or Chemistry 90, or Chemistry 100, or Physics 90, or Physics 100 .....	3
(f) Three courses, not already chosen, selected from the following: Biology 100, Botany 200, Chemistry 90, Chemistry 100, Chemistry 200, Chemistry 225, Commerce 191 (Economics 205), Economics 100, Economics 200, French 101, French 202, German 90 (Beginners'), German 100, Greek A, Greek 2, History 101, History 202, History 203, History 304, Latin 90 (Beginners'), Latin 101, Latin 202, Mathematics 200, Mathematics 201, Mathematics 202, Philosophy 100, Physics 90, Physics 100, Physics 200, Psychology 100, Psychology 101, Sociology 200, Zoology 200 .....	9

**Note:**—History 202 is open to First Year students only if they are preparing for entrance to Normal School. Philosophy 100, Sociology 200, Zoology 200, Botany 200, History 304, Economics 200 and Economics 205 (Commerce 191), are not open to First Year students.

2. Students who have not presented German or Latin for University Entrance may fulfil the language requirements for the degree by taking Beginners' German or Beginners' Latin (courses numbered 90), to be followed by German 100 and German 200, or by Latin 101 and Latin 202. They must complete 63 units for graduation. The extra three units may be taken in any year.

3. Greek A (which may be taken by students having no previous knowledge of Greek), followed by Greek 2, will be accepted as satisfying the Language requirements in the case of students who have presented Latin for University Entrance.

4. No student in his first year may elect more than one beginners' course in a language, and no beginners' course in a language will count towards a degree unless followed by a second year's work in that language.

5. Except in the case of beginners' courses, no course in a language may be taken by a student who has not offered that language for University Entrance. A beginners' course in a language may not be taken for credit by a student who has obtained credit for that language at entrance.

6. A student taking three languages in the first two years (18 units) may defer the course selected under (e) above until the Third or Fourth Year. A student taking four science courses (12 units) may defer the course selected under (d) to the Third or Fourth Year.

7. Students offering four science courses (12 units) in the First and Second Years may fulfil the

language requirement indicated above in section 1 (b) by taking any two of the following: French 101, French 202, Latin 90 (Beginners'), Latin 101, Latin 202, German 90 (Beginners'), German 100, Greek A, Greek 2. Only one beginners' course may be selected.

8. Students offering six science courses (18 units) in the First and Second Years may postpone the second course in a language under section 7 until the Third or Fourth Year.

9. Students who intend to teach High School work, and consequently will be obliged to take the Teacher Training Course after graduating, are advised to take Psychology 101 in the Second Year. Psychology 101 must be taken as an undergraduate course by such students.

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## II.

### COURSES LEADING TO THE DEGREE OF B. A. Sc. (APPLIED SCIENCE)

(Four-year course, for which the pre-requisite year in Arts and Science may be taken at Victoria College)

#### First Year

Students register in Arts and Science and take the following courses: English 100 and 101, Mathematics 100, Chemistry 100, Physics 100, French 101 or German 90 (Beginners'), or Latin 101.

For admission to the First Year of Applied Science the passing grade is 60 per cent. in Mathematics, Chemistry and Physics, and 50 per cent. in other subjects.

No student with any supplemental outstanding will be admitted to the First Year of Applied Science.

### III.

## COURSES LEADING TO THE DEGREE OF B. Com. (COMMERCE)

(Five-year course, two years of which may be taken at  
Victoria College)

### First and Second Years

Students must take:

#### First Year—

A course in First Year Arts and Science or the equivalent.

#### Second Year—

(a) English 200.

(b) Mathematics 201 or 202, or an additional course in the language taken in the First Year. Students who contemplate taking advanced work in Statistics (Economics 435) should take Mathematics 202.

(c) Economics 200.

(d) Commerce 191.

(e) Commerce 251.

A 60 percent. standing in Economics 200 will be required of all students proceeding to their Third Year.

In view of the importance which rightly attaches to the capacity for adequate and clear expression in writing, regulation 12, on page 33 of the Calendar, will be rigidly enforced at the end of the Second Year, and reasonable legibility in handwriting will be insisted upon.

## DOUBLE COURSE FOR THE DEGREES OF B. A. AND B. A. Sc.

(Six-year course, two years of which may be taken at  
Victoria College)

The requirements for the first and second years are as set forth for the first and second years of Arts and Science except as follows:

1. Physics 100 and Chemistry 100 must be taken. The passing grade for each of these subjects is 60 per cent. (The passing grade for Mathematics 100, English 100 and 101, and French 101 or Latin 101 is the same as that demanded for admission to the First Year of Applied Science, page 22.) Students are recommended to take Mathematics 202.
2. Chemistry 200 (except for Forestry), Mathematics 202 and Physics 200 may not be taken except as extra subjects. These are covered later in Applied Science.

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### COURSES IN NURSING AND HEALTH

1. The Combined Undergraduate Course (University and Hospital) is a six-year course leading to the degree of B. A. Sc. (Nursing) and the Diploma in Nursing of an associated hospital.

2. The Double Course in Arts and Science and Nursing and Health is a seven-year course, leading to the Degrees of B. A. and B. A. Sc. (Nursing).

One year of either of the above courses may be taken in Arts and Science at Victoria College. The requirements for this year's work are as follows:

English 100 and 101.

French 101 or German 90 (Beginners')  
or Latin 101.

Mathematics 100.

Chemistry 100 .

Biology 100.

Students in Nursing and Health are required to obtain a grade of 60 per cent. in either Biology or Chemistry, not both.

Upon the completion of the First Year in Arts and Science (Nursing Option) candidates should apply to the Registrar of the University, on or before August 15th, for admission to the Second Year in Nursing and Health.

Applications must be accompanied by a certificate showing that the applicant has satisfied the entrance requirements of an associated Hospital School of Nursing. Applicants must also, in the opinion of the Department of Nursing, be personally fitted for the profession: consequently, they should communicate with Miss Margaret E. Kerr, R. N., Department of Nursing, University of British Columbia, with regard to their intention of entering the nursing course.

The Faculty reserves the right of selection and admission of students entering the Second Year of the Combined Course. Preference will be given to applicants with the highest academic standing.

Applicants who are accepted by the Department of Nursing will be notified, and must make application for registration at once or lose their priority of acceptance.

No student with defective standing will be admitted to the Second Year in Nursing.

Candidates who expect to complete the requisite entrance standing through University or Senior Matriculation supplemental examinations must apply for admission as specified, and their admission will be considered subject to the results of these examinations.

## COURSE LEADING TO THE DEGREE OF B. S. A. (BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN AGRICULTURE)

This is a four-year course. By carefully selecting 30 units of work in the first two years of Arts and Science at the College, students may proceed to the University and complete the work for the B. S. A. degree in two years.

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### FOREST ENGINEERING AND FORESTRY

In the Session 1946-47 the University of British Columbia will offer a course leading to the degree of B. A. Sc. in Forest Engineering and also a new course leading to the degree of B. S. F.

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### COMBINED COURSES

The combined courses in Botany and Forestry, Commerce and Forestry, and Economics and Forestry, will be discontinued at the close of the 1945-46 session. However, students who have already entered these courses and who still require either one, or two years' further work to complete the courses may do so by fulfilling the requirements set forth on pages 322 and 323 of the 1945-46 Calendar of the University.

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### ADMISSION

For admission to the course in Forest Engineering a student must have completed the First Year of Arts and Science with credit for the courses shown below, or the equivalent by Senior Matriculation.

English 100 and 101, Mathematics 100, Chemistry 100, Physics 100, Latin 101, or French 101, or German 90 (Beginners').

For admission to the B. S. F. course a student must take Biology 100 instead of Physics 100.

The passing grade for entrance to Applied Science is 60 per cent. in Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics and Biology, and 50 per cent. in other subjects.

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## COURSES

Two main avenues of approach are open to students interested in forestry as a profession: **Forest Engineering**, in which the main stress is placed upon the engineering phases of the extraction and conversion of forest products; and **General Forestry** which deals with the growing, improving and administering of forest stands. In addition both options deal with the manufacturing and marketing phases of the forest industries.

In the **General Forestry (B. S. F.)** course, the student has the opportunity of following one of three main branches of forestry: **Technical Forestry**, which includes advanced courses in Silviculture, Mensuration and Forest Management; **Forest Business Administration**, in which courses in accounting, commercial law, marketing, business finance and industrial management are super-imposed upon his basic forestry training; and **Chemical Wood Products**, in which the student receives a thorough training in chemistry as well as forestry and will be fitted to carry on post-graduate work in the chemical utilization of wood.

(Four-year course, one year of which may be taken at  
Victoria College)

### First Year

English 100 and 101, Chemistry 100, Biology 100,  
Home Economics 100 and Home Economics 101, one  
of the following: Economics 100, History 101,  
French 101, Latin 101, German 90, Mathematics 100,  
Psychology 101.

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## COURSE LEADING TO A DEGREE IN PHARMACY

(Four-year course, one year of which may be taken at  
Victoria College)

### First Year

English 100 and 101, Mathematics 100, Chemistry  
100, Physics 90 or 100, and an elective. If student  
does not have credit for High School Latin III, he  
must take Latin 90 (Beginners') in place of an  
elective.

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## COURSE LEADING TO BACHELOR OF LAWS

For admission to the Faculty of Law, students  
must present evidence of having successfully com-  
pleted not less than two years of work in the Faculty  
of Arts and Science at the University of British  
Columbia, or its equivalent at an approved uni-  
versity.

These two years in Arts and Science may be taken  
at Victoria College.

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## PRE-NORMAL COURSE

This is a one-year course which fulfills the aca-  
demic requirements for a First Class Teaching Cer-  
tificate in the Province of British Columbia. It has  
been specially designed to dovetail with Normal  
School work.

The course contains neither Mathematics nor a Foreign Language, but is wholly composed of subjects that are of immediate and practical value to the teacher. It is open to all students with University Entrance, and carries 15 units of credit toward a degree in Arts.

The requirements for the year's work are as follows:

English 100 and 101.

History 202 or 203.

Psychology 100 or 101.

Economics 205.

Biology 100, or Chemistry 90 or 100, or Physics 90 or 100.

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## PRE-BUSINESS COURSE

(Not Given in 1946-47)

This is a one-year terminal course leading to a diploma. It is open to all holders of High School Graduation Certificate who have received C+ or better rating in the work of Grade 12, whether they have obtained University Entrance or not.

In the case of High School Graduates with University Entrance, this course carries partial university credit toward a degree—9 units in all. In the case of High School graduates without University Entrance, it carries no university credit toward a degree. It is primarily intended for students who for one reason or another do not see their way to taking a four-year university course, but who feel that one year of pre-vocational work at the university level will equip them more adequately for business life.

The requirement for the year's work are as follows:

Pre-Business English (See under Department of English).

Pre-Business History (See under Department of History).

Psychology 100.

Economics 200.

Economics 205.

Students who complete this course, and in addition present a certificate from a recognized Business College or High School stating that they have passed, at the close of their Victoria College Session, an examination in shorthand and typing at the level required in the final year of the High School Commercial Course, will be granted a Secretarial Diploma. This Diploma will qualify them to hold the better secretarial and stenographic positions in the business world.

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Students intending to pursue courses in Medicine, Home Economics, Law, Physical Education, etc., should obtain particulars of the requirements for these courses from the University or Institution at which they plan later to study.

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## NIGHT CLASSES

Special Night Classes in the First and Second Years of Arts are arranged at the beginning of each session. These classes are not open to students registered in the regular day classes. No student may take more than one Night Class Course (3 units) each session. Night Class students are subject to the same regulations and examinations as day students.

The classes to be offered in 1946-47 will be announced at the beginning of the session. Students interested should write for particulars about September 1st, 1946. The courses offered are chosen from the regular curriculum.

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## EXAMINATIONS AND ADVANCEMENT

1. Examinations in all subjects, obligatory for all students, are held in December and in April. Applications for special consideration on account of illness or domestic affliction must be submitted to the Registrar not later than two days after the close of the examination period. In cases where illness is the plea for absence from examinations, a medical certificate must be presented to the Registrar's Office.

2. The passing mark will be 50 per cent. in each subject. The regulations governing admission to the First Year of Applied Science are outlined on page 22 under the heading, "Courses Leading to the Degree of B. A. Sc. (Applied Science)." In any course which involves both laboratory work and written examinations, students may be debarred from examinations if they fail to present satisfactory results in laboratory work, and they will be required to pass in both parts of the course.

3. Successful candidates taking at least fifteen units of work will be graded as follows: First Class, an average of 80 per cent. or over; Second Class, 65 to 80 per cent.; Passed, 50 to 65 per cent.

4. A supplemental will be granted in a subject which a candidate has taken during the year, provided he has written the final examination and has obtained a mark of not less than 30 per cent. A candidate, however, will not be granted in any one year supplementals in more than six units.

Notice will be sent to all students who are entitled to supplemental examinations.

5. A request for the re-reading of an answer paper must be forwarded to the Registrar within two weeks after the results of the examinations are announced. Each applicant must state clearly his reasons for making such a request in view of the fact that the paper of a candidate who makes less than a passing mark in a subject is read at least a second time before results are tabulated and announced. A re-reading of an examination paper will be granted only with the consent of the Head of the Department concerned. The fee for re-reading a paper is \$2.00.

6. Supplemental Examinations will be held in September. A candidate who has been granted a supplemental may try the supplemental only once. If he fails in the supplemental he must either repeat his attendance in the course or substitute an alternative chosen in accordance with Calendar regulations.

A candidate with a failure or a supplemental examination outstanding in any subject which is on the Summer Session curriculum of the University, may clear his record by attending the Summer Session course in the subject and passing the required examinations.

7. Applications for supplemental examinations, accompanied by the necessary fees (see Schedule of Fees) must be in the hands of the Registrar by August 15th.

8. No student may enter a higher year with standing defective in respect of more than 3 units (see regulations in regard to advancement to Third Year Commerce, page 23, and in reference to First Year Applied Science, page 22. No student who has failures or supplementals outstanding in more than 3 units, or who has any failure or supplemental outstanding for more than a year of registered at-

tendance, shall be allowed to register for more than 15 units of work, these units to include either the subject (or subjects) in which he is conditioned or permissible substitutes.

9. A student may not continue in a later year any subject in which he has a supplemental examination outstanding from an earlier year, except in the case of compulsory subjects in the Second Year.

10. A student who fails twice in the work of the same year may, upon the recommendation of the Faculty, be required by the College Council to withdraw from the College.

11. Any student whose academic record, as determined by the tests and examinations of the first term of the First or Second Year, is found to be unsatisfactory, may, upon the recommendation of the Faculty, be required by the College Council to discontinue attendance at the College for the remainder of the session. Such student will not be re-admitted to the College as long as any supplemental examinations are outstanding.

12. Term essays and examination papers will be refused a passing mark if they are noticeably deficient in English, and, in this event, students will be required to pass a special examination in English, to be set by the Department of English.

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## DEPARTMENT OF BIOLOGY, BOTANY AND ZOOLOGY

Associate Professor: Jeffrey A. Cunningham  
Instructor: W. Gordon Fields

**Biology 100 (1)**—Introductory Biology.—The course is introductory to more advanced work in General Biology, Botany or Zoology; also to courses closely related to Biological Science, such as Agriculture, Forestry, Medicine and Nursing.

The fundamental principles of Biology; the interrelations of plants and of animals; life processes; the cell and division of labour; life-histories; relation to environment; dynamic biology.

The course is prerequisite to all courses in General Biology, Botany and Zoology.

Two lectures and three hours laboratory per week.

Three units.

**Botany 200 (1a)**—General Botany.—A course including a general survey of the several fields of Botany and introductory to more specialized courses in Botany.

This course is prerequisite to all other courses in Botany.

Text-book: Hill, Overholtz, Popp, *Botany*, McGraw-Hill; or Holman and Robbins, *General Botany*, Wiley.

Prerequisite: Biology 100.

Three lectures and three hours laboratory per week.

Three units.

**Zoology 200 (1)**—General Zoology.—A course on the structure, classification, life histories, and biology of animals.

This course is prerequisite to other courses in Zoology.

Text-book: Storer, *General Zoology*, McGraw-Hill.  
Reference: Hegner, *College Zoology*, 4th edition, Macmillan; Buchsbaum, *Animals Without Backbones*, University of Chicago; Romer, *Man and the Vertebrates*, University of Chicago.

Prerequisite: Biology 100.

Three lectures and three hours laboratory per week. Three units.

## DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY

Assistant Professor: Edward J. Savannah

Assistant Professor: Lewis J. Clark

**Chemistry 90 (A)**—General Survey of Chemistry.—This course will give a general survey of the field of chemistry for students not intending to specialize in any of the sciences. Laboratory experiments designed to give an insight into scientific methods will be performed.

This course will not be accepted as fulfilling the prerequisite for Chemistry 200, or any subsequent Chemistry course.

Reference: Deming, *Fundamental Chemistry*, Wiley.

Two lectures and two hours laboratory per week.

Three units.

**Chemistry 100 (1)**—General Chemistry.—A study of inorganic chemistry against a background of theory. Chemical arithmetic, the Periodic Table, and the fundamental theories will be stressed. Students must reach the required standard in both lecture and laboratory work.

Note: Students who have not taken High School Chemistry A will be required to take additional class work.

Text-book: Foster and Alyea, *An Introduction to General Chemistry*, Van Nostrand.

Three lectures and three hours laboratory per week.

Three units.

**Chemistry 200 (2)**—Qualitative and Quantitative Analysis.

(a) Qualitative Analysis.—A study of the chemical reactions of the common metallic and acid radicals, together with the theoretical considerations involved in these reactions.

Text: Noyes and Swift, *Qualitative Analysis*, Macmillan.

References: Engelder, *Calculations of Qualitative Analysis*, Wiley; Hammett, *Solutions of Electrolytes*, McGraw-Hill.

(b) *Quantitative Analysis*.—This course embraces the more important methods of gravimetric and volumetric analysis.

Prerequisite—Chemistry 100.

Two lectures and six hours laboratory per week.  
Three units.

**Chemistry 225 (C)—Organic Chemistry.**—A study of the more important aliphatic and aromatic compounds.

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## DEPARTMENT OF CLASSICS

Associate Professor: George P. Black

### GREEK

**Greek A** Pharr, *Homeric Greek, A Book for Beginners*, Heath; Robertson and Robertson, *The Story of Greece and Rome, Chapters I—XXXII*, Dent.

Four hours a week. Three units.

**Greek 2**—Homer, *Iliad*, 1, ll. 250-611, Pharr, Heath; Plato, *Apology*, with vocabulary, A. M. Adam, Cambridge Press; North and Hillard, *Greek Prose Composition*, Longmans; Norwood, *Writers of Greece*, Oxford Press.

Four hours a week. Three units

## LATIN

Latin 101 is open to students who have presented Latin for University Entrance or have taken the beginners' course; Latin 202 is open to those who have passed in Latin 101 or in Senior Matriculation Latin.

**Latin 90 (Beginners')**—This course is intended for students who have no previous knowledge of Latin. It is open for credit only to students who have not offered Latin for credit in University Entrance. The aims of the course include (1) a mastery of what is fundamental in Latin Grammar and Composition and the learning of a basic Latin vocabulary; and (2) a continuous correlation with English, in a careful study of the origins and meanings of English words derived from Latin and of the structure of the English sentence. During the latter part of the year selections from Latin authors will be read.

Text-book: Collar and Daniell, *First Year Latin*, revised by Jenkins, Ginn.

Four hours a week. Three units.

**101 (1)**—Introduction to Latin Literature.—The course opens with selections from prose authors; in the Second Term will be read selections from some of the representative poets of the late Republic and the early Empire. There will be practice in composition and reading in the history of Rome.

Text-books: Marchant and Watson, *Latin Prose Composition*, Bell; Robertson and Robertson, *The Story of Greece and Rome*, Chapters XXXIII—LIV, Dent.

Three hours a week. Three units.

202 (2)—Prose and Poetry of the Golden Age.—Reading in some of the prose of Cicero and in the developed epic as represented by Vergil; a brief history of Greece.

Text-books: Robertson and Robertson, *The Story of Greece and Rome*, Chapters I—XXXII, Dent; Allen and Greenough, *New Latin Grammar*, Ginn.

Texts: Cicero, *Catilinarian Orations*, ed. Upcott, Oxford University Press; Vergil, *Aeneid VI*, Page, Macmillan.

Three hours a week. Three units.

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## DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

Associate Professor: J. H. Aitchison

The courses in this department, with the exception of Commerce 191, are open only to candidates for the degree of B. Com.

191 (5)—**Commercial Geography**.—A broad survey of the economic and geographic factors which lie behind the structure of business, with particular emphasis upon the North American continent. Reports are required of students.

Text-book: Klimm, Starkey and Hall, *Introductory Economic Geography*, 2nd edition, Harcourt, Brace.

Three hours a week. Three units.

251 (1)—**Fundamentals of Accounting**.—A study of the financial records of business and the modern methods of achieving financial statements. The course includes practice in bookkeeping, the development of special journals, the use of work sheets, preparation of statements and a consideration of partnership and corporation accounting.

Written assignments must be prepared for each class period, and in addition one or two model sets of accounts are handled during the course of the academic year. Owing to the continuity of the work in accounting, students who are more than two weeks late in registering will not be permitted to register in Commerce I without the permission of the instructor. In order to qualify for examination the student is required to submit 75 per cent. of the written assignments.

Commerce 251 is a prerequisite to all other courses in Commerce.

### ECONOMICS

**Note.**—Economics 200 is the prerequisite for all other courses in the Department except Economics 100, Economics 205 and Sociology 200.

**100 (2)—Economic History.**—A survey of the factors of social and economic significance in the development of society from early times to the present day. Special attention will be given to the recent economic history of Great Britain and Canada.

## SOCIOLOGY

- 200 (1)—*Introduction to Sociology*.—The approach to the study of society is by way of the local community and its institutions. An evaluation of the importance of the geographic, the biological, the psychological, and the cultural factors in the de-

termination of the rise, growth, and functioning of groups will be undertaken. There will be an attempt to discover fundamental principles and to trace these principles in their interrelations. Several of the problems resulting from group contacts will be studied.

Three hours a week. Three units.

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## DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

100 (1a)—*Literature*—Elementary study of a number of literary forms to be chosen from the short story, the play, the novel, the essay, the simpler sorts of poetry.

Texts: Euripides, *Electra*, in Gilbert Murray's paraphrase; Shakespeare, *Othello*; Sheridan, *The School for Scandal*, Dent; Bernard Shaw, *Saint Joan*, Constable; *Twentieth Century Verse*, ed. Two hours a week.

101 (1b)—*Composition*—Elementary forms and principles of composition.

The work in composition consists of (1) themes and class exercises, and (2) written examinations. Students will be required to make a passing mark in each of these two parts of the work.

200 (2)—Literature—Studies in the history of English Literature. Lectures and texts illustrative of the chief authors and movements from Tottel's Miscellany to Shelley.

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## DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY

Assistant Professor: Sydney G. Pettit

101 (1)—Main Currents in Twentieth-Century History.—This course completes the study of World History in the high schools and offers a background for contemporary World problems. The following topics are discussed: The Great Powers at the Opening of the Century, Alliance and Entente, The Coming of the World War, The World

War, The Peace Treaties, The New Map of Europe, Reparations and War Debts, Security and Disarmament, The League of Nations, The Russian Revolution and the U. S. S. R., Italy and Fascism, Germany from Empire to Third Reich, Britain and France between the Wars, The New Balkans, The Little Entente and Poland, Nationalism and Imperialism in the Far East, The United States and World Peace, The Road to the Second World War.

Text-books: Benns, *Europe Since 1914*, Crofts, or Chambers, Grant and Bayley, *The Age of Conflict*, Harcourt, Brace; Schmitt, *The Triple Alliance and Triple Entente*, Oxford.

Essays will be assigned throughout the Session.

Four hours a week. Three units.

The fourth hour will be devoted to group discussions.

**202 (2)—History of Canada** (offered in 1946-47 and alternate years).—

Geographical Factors; Exploration and Early Settlements; the French Régime; Constitutional Development, 1759-1867; Economic and Social Progress to Confederation; Development of the Dominion of Canada since 1867; Canada in the Commonwealth; Canada in the World.

Text-books: Wittke, *A History of Canada*, McClelland and Stewart; Currie, *Canadian Economic Development*, Nelson; Report of Royal Commission on Dominion-Provincial Relations, Book I, *Canada, 1867-1939*, King's Printer, Ottawa; Wrong, *The Canadians*, Macmillan; Creighton, *Dominion of the North*, Houghton Mifflin; Scott, *Canada Today*, Oxford; Sage, *Canada from Sea to Sea*, University of Toronto.

203 (3)—Canada West of the Great Lakes (offered in 1947-48 and alternate years).—

The Place of Western Canada in Canadian Development; Anglo-French Rivalry in the West; Struggle for Supremacy between the Hudson's Bay Company and the North-West Company; the Selkirk Settlement; Discovery and Exploration of the Pacific Coast; the Maritime Fur Trade; the North-West Company in British Columbia; the Western Department of the Hudson's Bay Company, 1821-70; Rivalries in Old Oregon; the Colonial Period of British Columbia; Confederation; the Riel Rebellion; the Rise of the New West; the Agrarian Movement on the Prairies; Development of the Province of British Columbia.

Text-books: Wittke, *A History of Canada*, McClelland and Stewart; Howay, *British Columbia, The Making of a Province*, Ryerson; Sage, *Sir James Douglas and British Columbia*, University of Toronto; Morton, *A History of the Canadian West to 1870-71*, Nelson; Sage, *Canada from Sea to Sea*, University of Toronto; Howay, Sage and Angus, *British Columbia and the United States*, Ryerson.

Essays will be assigned throughout the Session.

Three hours a week. Three units.

304 (4)—Mediaeval Europe, 500-1300.—

A general outline of mediaeval history from the fall of the Roman Empire to the 13th century. Sketches of Byzantine history and of the rise of Islam are included, but the main emphasis is laid upon the culture of the 12th and 13th centuries in the West.

Text-books: Stephenson, *Mediaeval History*, revised edition, Harpers.

Essays are assigned throughout the session.

Three hours a week. Three units.

**Pre-Business History. (No University Credit).**

Present-day Canadian problems—their origin, development, and significance. Broad reading, essays and discussion.

Text: To be announced.

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**DEPARTMENT OF HOME ECONOMICS**

Instructor: Miss Beth T. Ramsay, B. Sc. in H. E.  
(Washington), M. A. (Columbia)

Instructor: Miss Muriel Johnson, B. Sc. (Sask.)

The following courses are open only to students of the degree course in Home Economics.

**100 (1).—Foods and Nutrition.**—Lectures are devoted to a study of human nutrition with emphasis on the requirements of the normal adult. The preparation of various types of food is presented from the experimental viewpoint in the laboratory hours.

Text-book: Chaney and Ahlborn, *Nutrition*, 3rd edition, Houghton Mifflin.

Prerequisite: Home Economics 90 or equivalent.

Two lectures and three hours laboratory a week.  
First Term. 1½ units.

**101 (2).—Principles of Design.**—The study and application of fundamental art principles to problems in design. Application of design principles to dress. Wardrobe planning.

Text-book: Goldstein, *Art in Everyday Life*, 3rd edition, Macmillan.

Two lectures and three hours laboratory a week.  
Second Term.  $1\frac{1}{2}$  units.

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## DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS

Assistant Professor: Robert T. D. Wallace

Instructor: (Mrs.) O. Phoebe Noble

100 (1)—**Introductory Mathematics.**—An elementary course in Algebra, including proportion, variation, logarithms, progressions, theory of quadratic equations, permutations, combinations, annuities, binomial theorem; Analytical Geometry, including the study of the straight line and circle, with an introductory study of the parabola, ellipse and hyperbola; elementary Trigonometry.

Text-books: Currier, Watson and Frame, *General Mathematics*, Macmillan; any book of five or six place trigonometric and logarithmic tables. Students who plan to enter the Faculty of Applied Science should obtain McGraw-Hill's *Six Place Tables*.

Four hours a week. Three units.

200 (2)—**Algebra and Geometry.**—Review of fundamentals, mathematical induction, complex numbers, theory of equations, determinants, convergency and divergency of series, and probability; review of conics, polar co-ordinates, and solid analytic geometry.

Text-books: Nowlan, *College Algebra*; Nowlan, *Analytic Geometry*, 3rd edition, McGraw-Hill.

Three hours a week. Three units.

201 (3)—**The Mathematical Theory of Investments.**—This course deals with the exponential law, the power law, curve fitting, the theory of interest, annuities, debentures, valuation of bonds, sinking funds, depreciation, probability and its application to life insurance.

Text-book: Hart, **Mathematics of Investment** (with tables), revised edition, Heath.

Reference: Bauer, **Mathematics Preparatory to Statistics and Finance**, Macmillan.

Three hours a week. Three units.

**202—Calculus.** Introduction to differential and integral calculus, with applications.

In 1947-48 and subsequent years this course will be prerequisite to Mathematics 300, 301, and 302.

Text-book: Miller, **Calculus**, Wiley.

Three hours a week. Three units.

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## DEPARTMENT OF MODERN LANGUAGES

### FRENCH

**101 (1).**—Text-book: Barton and Sirich, **New French Review, Grammar and Composition**, Crofts (1941).

Texts: *Types of the French Short Story*, edited by March, (Nelson); Molière, *Le Bourgeois gentilhomme*, Didier; *Les Cent meilleurs poèmes lyriques*, Gowans and Gray.

Considerable written work will be required throughout the course, as one of the chief aims will be to develop an ability to write correct French sentences.

Three hours a week. Three units.

Upon entering the Second Year the student must satisfy the Instructor that he has read the following: Louis Hémon, Marie Chapdelaine, Fayard.

**202 (2).**—Texts: Anatole France, Nelson; Balzac, *Le Père Goriot*, Nelson; *Les Cent meilleurs*

poèmes lyriques, Gowans and Gray. Independent reading to include Balzac, Eugénie Grandet; Anatole France, Le Crime de Sylvestre Bonnard, Holt; the author listed under Summer Reading; and other readings to be assigned later.

Composition in French based on the above texts. Much time will be devoted to practice in writing paragraphs and short essays.

There will be oral practice and tests.

Four hours a week. Three units.

### GERMAN

90—Beginners' Course.—Schinnerer, Beginning German, Macmillan; Thoma, Lausbubengeschichten, Heath.

Four hours a week. Three units.

100 (1a).—Texts: Chiles, German Composition and Conversation, Part I, Ginn; Muller-Partenkirchen, Kaum gemugend, Holt; Kastner, Drei Manner im Schnee, Crofts; Bruns, Book of German Lyrics, Heath.

Prerequisite: University Entrance or Beginners' German.

Three hours a week. Three units.

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## DEPARTMENT OF PHILOSOPHY AND PSYCHOLOGY

Associate Professor: John M. Ewing

### PHILOSOPHY

100 (1)—Introduction to Philosophy.—An introductory study of the questions raised by major philosophers who have contributed to the background of present-day thought. This study will be based on a reading of selected primary sources, and it will aim at obtaining perspective on contemporary scientific, literary, social, and religious issues.

Text-books: Plato, *The Republic*, Scribners; Randall, Buckler, and Shirk, *Readings in Philosophy*, Barnes and Noble; Whitehead, *Adventures of Ideas*, Pelican.

Three hours a week. Three units.

## PSYCHOLOGY

Psychology 100 or 101 is a prerequisite for all courses in Psychology numbered 200—500.

**100 (A)—Introductory Psychology.**—The study of basic forms of human thinking and acting from a scientific and a practical standpoint.

Text-book: To be announced.

Three hours a week. Three units.

(Not given in 1946-47.)

**101 (1)—Elementary Psychology.**—Psychology as a science; basic forms of human activity, maturation, adjustment and maladjustment, emotion, sensation, learning, intelligence, reasoning, and personality.

Text-book: Dashiell, *Fundamentals of General Psychology*, Houghton Mifflin.

Three hours a week. Three units.

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## DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICS

Assistant Professor: William H. Hughes

**90 (A)—Introduction to Physics.**—A course of demonstration lectures in non-mathematical language presenting the fundamental principles of physics so that they can be understood by students who have had no previous special training in the subject. The lectures deal with the principles of mechanics, properties of matter, heat, light, sound and electricity and are supplemented by practical work in the laboratory. The chief aim of the course is to give the minimum acquaintance with physical science requisite for a liberal education to those whose studies will be mainly literary. Students

must reach the required standing in both theoretical and practical work.

This course is open only to students who have not presented Physics for University Entrance.

Text-book: White, *Classical and Modern Physics*, Van Nostrand.

Reference: Lemon, *From Galileo to Cosmic Rays*, University of Chicago Press.

Three lectures and two hours laboratory per week.  
Three units.

**100 (1)—Elementary Physics.**—A study of general college physics suitable for those students who have obtained credit for University Entrance Physics A or its equivalent. The course covers the fundamental principles of mechanics, properties of matter, heat, light, sound, electricity and some of the more recent developments in physics in a more quantitative way than Physics A.

Prerequisite: Physics 90 or University Entrance Physics A.

Text-book: Stewart, *Physics, A Text-book for Colleges*, 4th edition, Ginn.

Reference: Smith, *Elements of Physics*, McGraw-Hill.

Three lectures and two hours laboratory per week.  
Three units.

**200 (1)—Mechanics, Molecular Physics, and Heat.**—A study of statics and dynamics of both a particle and a rigid body, the laws of gases, molecular theory, temperature, calorimetry, radiation laws, and elementary thermodynamics.

Text-books: Reynolds, *Elementary Mechanics*, Prentice-Hall; Allen and Maxwell, *Text-book of Heat*, Macmillan.

Prerequisite: Physics 100.

Three lectures and three hours laboratory per week.  
Three units.
