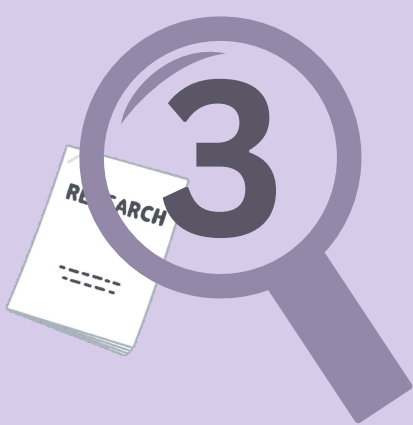


Building a Foundation
