THE purpose of Victoria College is to give students of Victoria City, adjacent municipalities, and Vancouver Island generally, an opportunity of receiving instruction in the first two years in the Arts and Science course as prescribed by the University of British Columbia. Students can attend classes in the First and Second Years in Arts and Science on the same curriculum as obtains at the parent University; they are submitted to the same tests and examinations, and may proceed directly to their third year in the University of British Columbia, or in any other University which accepts the certificates of the University of British Columbia.

The College building is situated near the junction of Yates and Fort Streets, within two minutes' walk of the street cars, and commands the most beautiful views of the City of Victoria, of the Gulf of Georgia, and of the Olympic Mountains in the State of Washington.

Students from a distance who intend to make teaching their life work, and who choose the Victoria Normal School as the place of their professional education, will find Victoria College admirably situated for the non-professional part of their studies, as they will be near the Principal of the Normal School, who is always pleased to give advice and assistance to young people who wish to enter the teaching profession.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Session

The College Year or Session is divided into two terms. The first begins on Monday, September 23rd, 1929, and the second on Monday, January 6th, 1930.

Courses of Study

For the Session 1929-30 the College offers instruction in the first two years of the Faculty of Arts and Science, leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Science, Bachelor of Applied Science.

Board and Residence

A list of approved boarding-houses which receive men and women students, but not both, may be obtained from the Registrar. Men and women students are not permitted to lodge in the same house, unless they are members of the same family, or receive special permission from the Faculty.

REGISTRATION

Application for Admission

All inquiries for admission to the College should be addressed to the Registrar.

Except under special circumstances, no student under the age of sixteen is admitted to the First Year Courses in the Faculty of Arts and Science.

Candidates for admission to the courses in the First Year of the Faculty of Arts and Science are required to pass the Junior Matriculation Examination of the Province of British Columbia, or to submit certificates showing that they have passed an equivalent examination elsewhere.

Students who have passed the Senior Matriculation Examination are admitted to the courses of the Second Year in the Faculty of Arts and Sciences.

ATTENDANCE

Those who intend to register as students of the Victoria College for the session 1929-30 are required to make application to the Registrar before Wednesday, September 18th, on forms to be obtained at the Registrar's office.

There are three classes of students:

(a) Full Undergraduates — Students who have passed all the examinations precedent to the year in which they are registered.

(b) Conditioned Undergraduates—Students proceeding to a degree, but who have incomplete entrance qualifications, or who are required to pass supplemental examinations in a year previous to that in which they are registered.

(c) Partial Students—Students not belonging to one of the two preceding classes.

Partial students are not normally required to pass an examination for admission, but, before registering, they must produce a certificate showing that they have satisfied the Principal and the Heads of the Departments concerned that they are qualified to pursue with advantage the course of study which they propose to undertake.

All students are required to attend in person at the office of the Registrar before Wednesday, September 18th, to furnish the information necessary for the College records, to register for the particular classes which they wish to attend, and to sign the following declaration:

"I hereby accept and submit myself to the statutes, rules, regulations and ordinances of the Victoria College and of the Faculty in which I am registered, and to any amendments thereto which may be made while I am a student of the College, and I promise to observe the same."

In the information furnished for the College records, students are requested to state what

churches they propose to make their place of worship. This information is available for any of the city churches desiring it.

Students registering for the first time must present the certificates which constitute their qualification for admission to the course of study for which they wish to register.

Students are required to attend at least seven-eighths of the lectures in each course that they take. Admission to a lecture or laboratory and credit for attendance may be refused by the Instructor for lateness, misconduct, inattention or neglect of study. Absence consequent on illness or domestic affliction may be excused only by the Principal, and medical certificates or other evidence must be presented immediately on return to College work. In cases of deficient attendance students may (with the sanction of the Principal and the Head of the Department concerned) be excluded from the final examination in a course; but unless the unexcused absences exceed one-fourth of the total numbers of lectures in a course, such students may sit for supplemental examinations.

After these dates an additional fee of \$2.00 will be exacted from all students in default.

The Alma Mater Fee is a fee exacted from all students for the support of the Alma Mater Society, and was authorized by the Board of Governors at the request of the students.

The Caution Money is a deposit from which deductions will be made to cover damages to the College buildings, furniture or other property, as well as breakages, wastage, and use of special materials in laboratories, etc. If the balance to the credit of a student is exhausted, a further deposit of \$2.00 is required.

3. Students registering after October 7th shall pay their fees at the time of registration.
4. Special fees are—Regular supplemental examination, per paper \$ 5.00
Special examination, per paper 7.50
Supplemental examination fees must be paid two weeks before the examination, special examination fees when application for examination is made.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND PRIZES

WALTER NICHOL SCHOLARSHIP — Fifty dollars awarded to the first year student taking highest standing in French and continuing the course in the second year at the Victoria College. Donated by the late Walter C. Nichol, LL.D.

ROYAL INSTITUTION AND FRANK EATON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP—Awarded to the student taking the highest standing in English of the second year.

AGNES DEANS CAMERON SCHOLARSHIP— Given by Mrs. F. V. Longstaff. Fifty dollars (\$50) awarded to the first year student taking the highest standing in English and continuing the course in the second year at Victoria College.

ALLIANCE FRANÇAISE.—Prize of fifty dollars (\$50) to the student in the second year who has made the most progress in French and who intends to continue university work in this subject.

DAVID SPENCER, LTD.—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the first year student taking highest standing in Mathematics and continuing the course in the second year at Victoria College.

KIWANIS CLUB—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to a man completing his first year and entering the second year at Victoria College.

CECILIA GREEN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP—One hundred dollars (\$100) awarded to the student of Victoria High School who ranks first in general proficiency in the Junior Matriculation Examination of the University of British Columbia held in June. This scholarship is awarded only to a student in attendance at Victoria College or other institution approved by a special committee.

VICTORIA WOMEN'S CANADIAN CLUB—Seventy-five dollars (\$75) awarded to the woman student taking the highest standing in the Matriculation Examination to Victoria College.

UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S CLUB—Fifty dollars (\$50) awarded to the woman student taking the highest standing in her first year, and continuing her course in second year at Victoria College.

I. O. D. E.—A scholarship of three hundred dollars (\$300) a year, for four years, awarded to the son or daughter of a soldier who was either killed or totally disabled in the Great War. This scholarship is open to any student in the Province, and applications should be sent to the Provincial Secretary of the I. O. D. E.

VICTORIA MEN'S CANADIAN CLUB—Prize of twenty-five dollars (\$25) awarded to the student of the Victoria College taking the highest standing in Canadian History.

MAJOR F. V. LONGSTAFF—Fifty dollars (\$50) awarded to the first year student taking the highest standing in Latin and continuing the course in the second year at Victoria College.

COURSES LEADING TO DEGREE OF B.A.

First and Second Years

The work of the first two years consists of 30 units, 15 of which must be taken in each year.

Each student must take:	Units
(a) English 1 in the First Year and English 2 in the Second Year	6
(b) The first two courses in a language offered for Matriculation, one course in each year	6
(c) Mathematics 1, in the First Year	3
(d) Economics 1, or History 1 or 2 or 4, Philosophy 1	3
(e) Biology 1, Chemistry 1, or Physics 1 or 2	3
(f) Three courses, not already chosen, selected from the following: Biology 1, Chemistry 1, Economics 1, Economics 2, French 1, French 2, Beginners' Greek, Greek 1, Greek 2, History 1, History 2, History 3, Latin 1, Latin 2, Mathematics 2, Mathematics 3, Philosophy 1, Physics 1, Physics 2, Zoology 1	9

Note—Economics 1 and Philosophy 1 are open to First Year students only if the permission of the Heads of these departments is obtained. History 2 is open to First Year students only if they are preparing for entrance to the Normal School. Zoology 1 and History 4 are not open to First Year students.

No beginners' course in a language will count towards a degree unless followed by a Second Year's work in that language.

A student taking three languages in the first two years may defer the course selected under (e) above until the Third or Fourth Year.

Note—For students intending to enter the Faculty of Applied Science:

1. Nursing and Health courses require Junior Matriculation (as for Arts).

2. All other courses require:

(a) Junior Matriculation or equivalent.

(b) Also a First Year Arts course or equivalent, which shall include the following subjects: Chemistry 1; Mathematics 1 (Algebra, Geometry and Trigonometry); Physics 1 or 2; English 1; Latin 1, or French 1, or German B.

The passing grade is fifty per cent. for Chemistry, Physics and each of the Mathematics subjects; but in the others a pass of forty per cent. will be accepted, provided an average of fifty per cent. has been obtained in the total.

Biology 1 may be taken as an optional extra subject, and, if passed with a grade of at least fifty per cent., need not be taken in Applied Science. Economics 1 taken in Arts is accepted in lieu of Economics in Applied Science. A reading knowledge of French and German is desirable for students in Engineering.

3. No student may enter with any outstanding supplemental in Junior Matriculation or in any of the Chemistry, Mathematics or Physics subjects listed above; or with supplementals in other subjects to the extent of more than three units.

Students who have failed to complete the above requirements may apply for permission to take the September supplemental examinations in Arts.

EXAMINATIONS AND ADVANCEMENT

1. Examinations in all subjects, obligatory for all students, are held in December and April. Applications for special consideration on account of illness or domestic affliction must be submitted to the Principal not later than two days after the close of the examination period.

2. In the First and Second Years, candidates will not be considered as having passed unless they obtain at least 40% on each subject and 50% on the aggregate. In the case of Beginners' Greek the passing mark is 50%. In any course which involves both laboratory work and written examinations, students may be debarred from examination if they fail to present satisfactory results in laboratory work, and they will be required to pass in both parts of the course.

3. Successful candidates will be graded as follows: First Class, an average of 80% or over; Second Class, 65 to 80%; Passed, 50 to 65%.

4. If a student's general standing in the final examination of either year is sufficiently high, the Faculty may grant him supplemental examinations in the subject or subjects in which he has failed, but a student obtaining less than 30% in a subject will not be granted a supplemental examination in that subject, except by special permission of the Faculty. Notice will be sent to all students to whom such examinations have been granted.

5. Supplemental examinations will be held in September and will not be granted at any other time, except by special permission of the Faculty, and on payment of a fee of \$7.50 per paper. To pass a supplemental examination, a candidate must obtain at least 50 per cent. A candidate with a supplemental examination outstanding in any subject which is on the Summer Session curriculum may clear his record by attending the Summer Session

course in the subject and passing the required examinations.

6. Applications for supplemental examinations, accompanied by the necessary fees (see schedule of Fees) must be in the hands of the Registrar at least two weeks before the date set for the examinations.

7. No student may enter a higher year with supplemental examinations still outstanding in respect of more than 3 units of the preceding year, nor with any supplemental examination outstanding in respect of the work of an earlier year or of Matriculation unless special permission to do so is granted by Faculty. Such permission will be granted only when Faculty is satisfied that the failure to remove the outstanding supplemental examinations had adequate cause.

8. A student may not continue in a later year any subject in which he has a supplemental examination outstanding from an earlier year, except in the case of compulsory subjects in the Second Year.

9. A student who is not allowed to proceed to a higher year may not register as a partial student in respect of the subjects of that higher year. But a student who is required to repeat his year will be exempt from attending lectures and passing examinations in subjects in which he has already made at least 50 per cent. In this case he may take, in addition to the subjects of the year which he is repeating, certain subjects of the following year.

10. A student who fails twice in the work of the same year may, upon the recommendation of the Faculty, be required by the Senate to withdraw from the College.

11. Any student whose academic record, as determined by the tests and examinations of the first term of the First or Second Year, is found to be unsatisfactory, may, upon the recommendation of the Faculty, be required by the Senate to discontinue attendance at the College for the remainder

of the session. Such a student will not be readmitted to the College as long as any supplemental examinations are outstanding.

12. Term essays and examination papers will be refused a passing mark if they are noticeably deficient in English, and, in this event, students will be required to pass a special examination in English to be set by the Department of English.
