DIRECTOR'S REPORT

BIG was launched in the summer of 2013. The last 24 months have been very intense for all involved in the research program. We moved quickly onto establishing our Advisory Boards and focused in particular on getting feedback on our research assumptions and research strategy. We also worked hard at aligning research methodologies across all the areas of social science and humanities that are involved in the research program. We have active social media sites, including Facebook and Twitter, which allow us to engage with interested stakeholders around the world.

In September 2014 at Carleton University, we hosted our first of three international conferences with over 150 academics, students and policy makers participating. In June 2015 at Yukon College, we hosted our first of ten summer schools. We took an innovative approach to the summer

school, offering an online team-taught course from January to April to students from several institutions in the BIG partnership. Students developed projects based on topics identified by the Yukon government and then extended their research beyond the end of the course to prepare for presenting their findings at the summer school to an audience of policy-makers and border experts from our worldwide network. We will use this model for some of the future summer schools. BIG was also able to leverage two MITACs internships during the summer of 2015, on the applied border culture work with ASI Heritage. Finally, we have co-sponsored three border conferences in South America, and will continue to support international conferences around the world in the coming years.

We talk to both our Canadian and international teams monthly by videoconference. With our Canadian partners, we discuss research projects, outreach activities, coordinate summer schools and online courses, and ensure the regional studies are comparative and align with the overall framing for the themes. With

our international colleagues, we discuss the current state of borders studies in different regions of the world, and we have drafted a template for the international case studies and country papers. These monthly

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meetings have strengthened the partnership and facilitated a coordinated approach to the overall research program.

Thanks to this diverse and committed group of lead scholars, BIG has been able to bring different sectors of society (including public, private and civil society members) together to discuss matters of common

concern. Furthermore, through support to new partner institutions, we are fostering the growth of border studies in regions of the world that have not traditionally been a part of the conventional border studies circles; the result is the inclusion of different perspectives into the debates. In practice, we are currently developing agreements with institutions in Mexico, Colombia and Brazil, and have invited institutions in China, Morocco, Russia and Vietnam to join the partnership.

Our core research focus is to challenge the well-established concept that borders

are primarily understood as territorial boundaries that emerge out of international treaties. Indeed, we question whether the territorial frame, or “territorial trap”, in academic terms, adequately captures current forms of bordering processes, including territorial boundaries. In pursuit of answers to these questions, we have divided our research program into two key areas: regional studies and thematic studies (which include a sub-set on international country cases).

In the regional studies (see RESEARCH, p. 24), we take the perspective of territories (at various scales), regions and states and make the assumption that there are multiple challenges to the “territorial trap”. One such example is networked policies that overlap many different policy scales, including, but not exclusively, that of the sovereign territories of states. Research projects addressing these challenges look at established ways to understand the culture, the history, the governance, the flows, the security and sustainability of policies that exist on each side of borders. These studies also identify contemporary challenges to the existence of the boundary line when culture, history, governance, flows, security or sustainability policies straddle the boundary, the borderland, or the border region. These studies, set in the Canadian context, question the uniquely territorial nature of state borders, which then also suggest questioning the ‘uniquely territorial

nature of sovereignty' and of 'territorial integrity' and 'self-determination'. At this time, we have 43 research projects undertaken by colleagues and their students addressing those questions.

At the thematic level, our research hypothesizes that contemporary borders in globalization are processes that in many instances are fundamentally "a-territorial". We assume that bordering processes are not uniquely territorial anymore, but fundamentally linked to interactions across the world. Our research program approaches this set of assumptions from the perspectives of networks and flows that each have a history, are cultural, are fluid in nature like trade, migrations and environmental changes, and security, and ultimately have led to new forms of governance. Borders and bordering processes are not territorial because the border is ultimately 'carried' by individuals, goods, and/or information. Current research on these new forms of bordering processes discusses the existence of borderscapes – spaces that are not specifically territorial but can be cultural, legal, or regulatory. Globalization is driving these processes. Our view is that more research is necessary to better understand these phenomena.

Thus our thematic and international studies focus on the manifestations of new borders in globalization. These studies collect data to understand and to question the 'new'

bordering principles that appear when culture, history, governance, flows, security or sustainability contribute to contemporary bordering processes. For example, in the governance theme, we examine instances where states and governments, within their own sovereign territories, are less likely to be primary actors of the bordering processes, and where borderscapes organize the status of individuals, communities, or regions (e.g. First Nations or other social groups). In our flows theme, we look at how goods and data-packages are bordered, at-source for instance, during the production process and then travel the world in uninterrupted moving flows. At this time, we have 47 research projects addressing such questions.

We are looking forward to working closely with our non-academic partners and building on our research agenda to ensure that our findings impact border policy. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our diverse group of scholars, advisory board members and students for making the first two years of the Borders in Globalization research program a fascinating and entrepreneurial adventure in the worlds of social sciences and humanities.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

- BIG organized bi-annual regional and international Advisory Round Tables.
- BIG established a presence on social media platforms including Facebook and Twitter, launched our website in July 2014 and is producing videos to showcase our work.
- BIG academic leads meet once a month through videoconferencing to discuss research directions, updates on progress and activities, and administrative issues. This has resulted in a connected core group of scholars, developing comparative and policy relevant topics.
- In September 2014 at Carleton University, BIG organized our first of three international conferences. The purpose was to launch our research activities and bring together both our academic and non-academic partners. The involvement of non-academic partners was vital for soliciting feedback on the conceptual framings and the preliminary case studies identified. We had over 150 participants and,

unlike other academic conference, we constructed our panels to include academics, students, and practitioners. There were breakout sessions on our six themes and seven regions, featured presentations from leading border scholars, and guest lectures from Professors Michael Dear (UC Berkeley), William Walters (Carleton University), and Charles Heller and Lorenzo Pezzani (Goldsmiths, University of London). Sarah Green (University of Helsinki) and Reece Jones (University of Hawaii) delivered the Keynote Lectures. The initial conference also provided opportunities for border professionals to enhance their understanding of border issues outside their immediate realms of expertise and facilitated dialogue between the various stakeholders engaged on border management in Canada.

- With the co-funding of the European Union Center of Excellence at the University of Victoria, BIG launched our first Open Online Course “European Borders Without Walls” in Fall 2014. 72 participants from around the world (over 25 countries) signed up and over half completed the course requirements—a great accomplishment for an open online course.

- In June 2014, with the Government of the Yukon and Yukon College, BIG organized the first of 10 summer schools “Borders in the North”. We took an innovative approach to the summer school, offering an online team-taught course from January to April to eight students from several institutions in the BIG partnership. The course explored the themes of the project as related to the north. Students chose term-paper topics identified by Yukon Government officials. Students received feedback on their papers from government officials working before presenting to a collection of border scholars from the BIG partnership, civil society members, Yukon College faculty and staff and the broader Whitehorse community.
- Currently, 43 students and researchers are at work collecting data in our seven Canadian regions (Atlantic, Arctic, Quebec, Great Lakes, Prairies, Rockies, and Pacific) and for nine comparative country studies (Denmark, Finland, France, Israel, Japan, Mexico, Netherlands, the United States).
- Currently, 47 students and researchers are at work collecting data on our six Borders in Globalization research themes: Culture,

History, Sustainability and Security, Flows of trade and migration, and, Governance.

- The BIG project has gained additional dividends of border studies engagement and project development and outreach by seeking out non-academic partners committed to exploring the potential extensions of border studies research and instruction within applied areas. One emerging story is the case of the partnership with ASI-Archaeological Services Incorporated, one of Ontario's and Canada's leading heritage compliance, assessment and conservation firms. ASI which employs more than 60 regular employees out of Toronto, Burlington and London, Ontario, participated in several BIG Roundtables and the inaugural BIG Conference at Carleton University. The CEO and a senior partner along with several staff have participated and discussed potential partnering with BIG during the first years of the project. In 2015, the partnership became a reality with BIG and ASI agreeing to work on two projects in the culture theme, both based in Ontario. The first project is an exploration of the significance of borders and bordering in cultural heritage work in Ontario, with a focus on the Niagara escarpment. A masters candidate in Landscape Architecture has completed this research while working as an intern

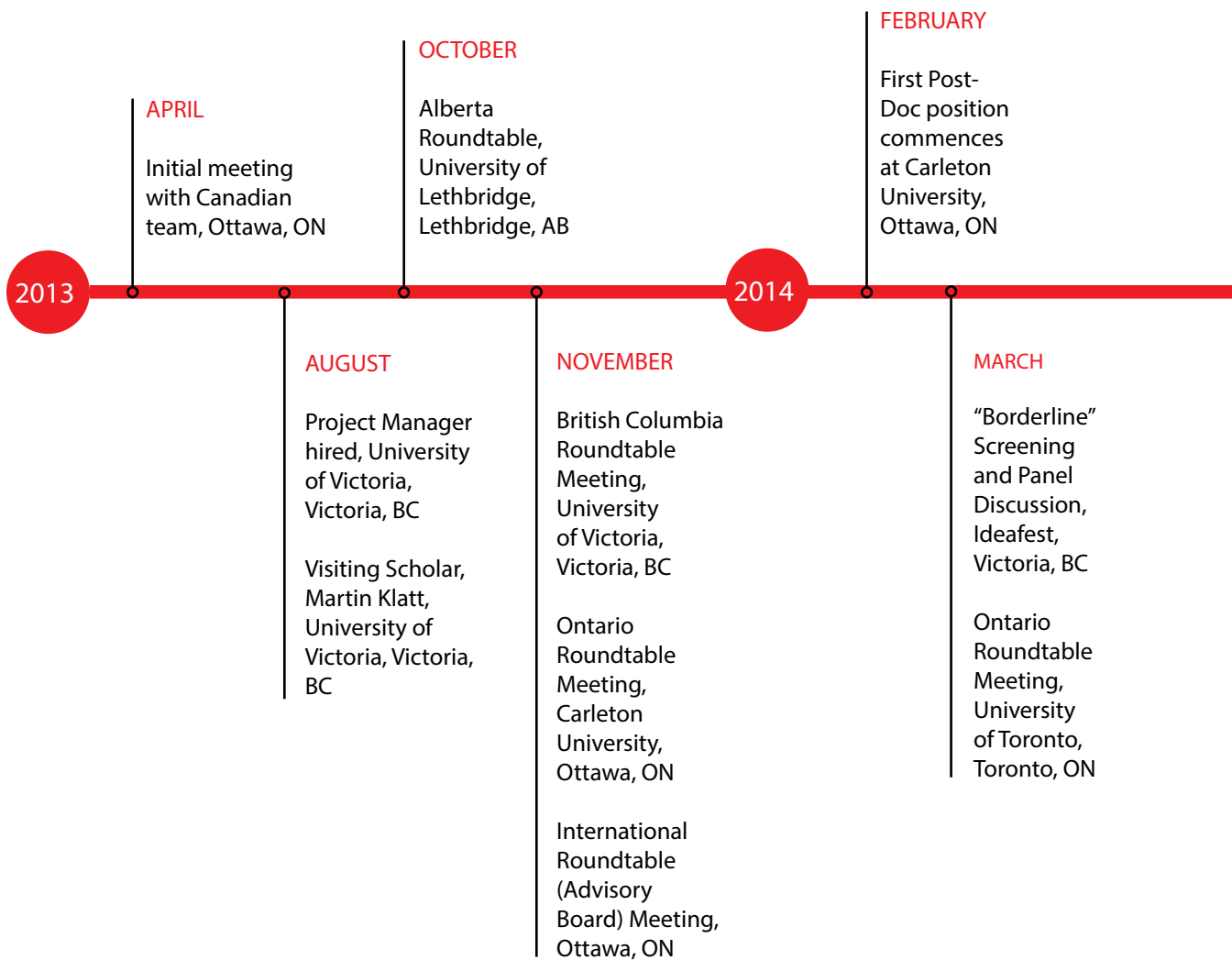
at ASI during May through September, 2015. This project will be showcased at the BIG International Roundtable along with another ASI-BIG collaboration. In the other instance, a PhD student in archaeology, Amy St. John, has been working with ASI CEO Ron Williamson on one of the most exciting boundary issues in Canadian prehistory: the origin of the Iroquois-Algonquin boundary in what is now Canada's heartland. For this internship, ASI-BIG secured a Mitacs award which co-funded the internship with a matching commitment from ASI. With these two internships BIG has taken the partnership to a new level of accomplishment, collaboration and achievement.

- In the fall of 2015, Dr. Martin Geiger (Political Science, Carleton) one of the BIG collaborating scholars, and a recent Banting Scholar, initiated an innovative approach to developing teaching and research excellence in contemporary migration research and issues. Working with the BIG team at Carleton, and drawing on the ample interest in human migration and diaspora issues at Carleton, Martin has assembled a team of four graduate students (one PhD, and three MAs) who meet regularly during the academic year 2015-16 to explore these human migration issues and each will develop a paper based on original research to contribute to the BIG project.

All of the issues are of relevance to Canadian immigration policy and also connected to global events and problems. In addition, the team will participate in the BIG summer school at Carleton to share their project with course registrants and engage the summer school participants in a migration discourse about migration and borders in globalization.

- BIG colleagues are continuously traveling the globe and presenting their research supported by BIG. For example, BIG Co-Director, Victor Konrad, had several visiting professorships in Europe and Asia in 2015. During this time, he presented about 25 BIG related talks and papers at border studies conferences in the US, Canada, Europe and Asia. These talks generated substantial interest in the BIG research agenda, and we are working with new partners to bring them into the project. In just the fall of 2015, Dr. Konrad presented at the University of Eastern Finland, University of Luxembourg-LISER, University of Strasbourg, Radboud University Nijmegen, and University of Amsterdam.
- The University of Victoria has hosted seven international border scholars for extended stays through our EU-Borders Visiting Scholars program, which is co-funded by the Centre for Global Studies and the European Union Centre of Excellence.

RESEARCH

Our core research focus challenges the well-established conception that borders are primarily territorial boundaries that emerge out of international treaties. Contemporary borders in globalization are processes that in many instances are fundamentally “a-territorial” because the border is ultimately carried by individuals, goods, and/or information. In examining this shift from a territorial approach to an a-territorial approach to border studies, we have divided our research program into international, regional and thematic studies.

Regional studies take place at both the international level by colleagues around the world, and by lead scholars in North America who examine the Canadian borders and the US/Mexico border. The thematic studies attempt to understand and to question the ‘new’ bordering principles that appear when culture, history, governance, flows, security or sustainability contribute to contemporary bordering processes.

INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

Our international partners are drafting a state of border studies paper in their country and will organize policy forums in conjunction with the study (several of these have already taken place). These studies cover four continents and include borders of nearly 40 countries. We intend to publish the studies in 2017 as a book on international borders.
